In our inaugural Scotland Staycation Index, we wanted to lift a lid on the tourism boom that Scotland is witnessing.

After an undoubtedly difficult year, the Scotland staycation market came back fighting – and there's no sign of demand slowing anytime soon.

As a proud Scot myself, it's easy to see why Scotland is fast becoming a firm favourite amongst holidaymakers. With stretches of deserted beaches, panoramic mountain views and expanses of national parks – there are plenty of reasons to opt for a staycation in Scotland.

According to our research, almost a third (31%) of UK adults will holiday in Scotland this year - with three quarters (76%) of Scots planning to holiday in their own country during 2021.

And although this staycation boom in Scotland has undoubtedly been fuelled by international travel restrictions this year, our research suggests that even beyond the pandemic Scotland will remain a first-choice travel destination for many.

In this report, we reveal the travel trends driving a surge in demand for staycations in Scotland – including this year's most popular hotspots, preferred types of trip, and the most soughtafter holiday home features.

Separately, we also explore how a surge in staycations has prompted second homeowners in Scotland to consider letting their property as a new investment opportunity – jumping at the chance to generate an additional income.

Our research includes the key findings from our booking data, as well as insights from consumer research we conducted with UK adults.



### We explore the ingredients for a successful holiday let

It has undoubtedly been a hard year for holiday let owners, but the silver lining is that they will benefit from increased staycation demand this summer. Sykes has reported a significant uplift in owner enquiries in Scotland this year, with second homeowners clearly recognising the revenue opportunity that lies ahead. With an average income of £16,000 a year for a holiday let in Scotland, the rewards are substantial – and this year is set to be more fruitful than ever.



# Analysis of the return of investment (ROI) for holiday homes in Scotland vs. buy-to-lets

After welcoming record numbers of tourists to Scotland this summer, buy-to-let investors across the country may now be tempted to cash in on the boom in tourism. With stringent tax rules on buy-to-lets making it increasingly difficult to turn a profit, who could really blame them for exploring short-term letting as an alternative?

We analysed the ROI of buy-to-lets and holiday lets in regions across the country to identify the top holiday home investment hotspots. This analysis is based on Sykes rental income and Scottish government rental figures, along with house price data from Home.co.uk.

# Couple climb to success with Highland holiday home

Susan Hunt, 62, has been renting out her property in the Scottish Highlands for five years now – but this year bookings are busier than ever.

Keen to turn their hand to holiday letting, Susan and her husband Nick, a former dental nurse and policeman, decided to make the move from Bristol to the Scottish Highlands back in 2015, along with their two children and Susan's mother.

Eager to embrace a whole new lifestyle and a change of scenery in their retirement, the couple purchased the perfect plot of land in picturesque Roy Bridge, Inverness-shire, investing £140k in building and furnishing Spinnyfield, a two-bedroom holiday home.

Offering stunning mountain views, as well as a garden and covered patio area, the cottage provides the perfect year-round retreat. It's a stone's throw away from Fort William and only a 15-minute drive away from the Nevis Range Mountain Experience, where lovers of the outdoors can ski, hike, play golf, or even canoe and kayak.

The success of the holiday home has far surpassed the family's expectations, with the cottage generating an average of £24,000 in annual gross earnings prior to the pandemic.



This year, bookings have been busier than ever, with the property fully booked right up until the end of 2021 and already starting to see bookings roll in for 2022.

With its sprawling, unbridled landscape, incorporating rugged mountains and deep-blue lochs, the Scottish Highlands is proving to be an increasingly sought-after destination for UK breaks, ranking the fourth most popular location across the UK overall.

# A stronger staycation market in Scotland is here to stay

The travel industry has changed shape over the past 18 months, but Scotland's staycation sector has emerged stronger than ever in 2021.

Staycations continue to provide welcome respite for many holidaymakers looking for an escape this year, and the appetite for Scotland as a first-choice travel destination has reached new highs.

With stretches of dramatic coastlines, world-renowned mountain peaks and freshwater lochs, it's easy to see why Scotland is a firm favourite for UK holidaymakers this year.

And encouragingly, our data shows the appetite for staycations in Scotland is expected to grow even beyond the pandemic, with bookings for 2022 already rolling in.

Holiday letting has become an increasingly attractive investment opportunity to Scots as a result of this growing demand – with a quarter saying they're now more likely to consider it as a means to providing extra income.

Our data also shows a significant number have already jumped at the opportunity to invest in holiday lets over the past year, with the difference in return of investment potential compared to buy-to-lets likely to be a big driver of this decision.

#### Methodology:

Bookings data for the year ahead was used to provide a snapshot of the staycation market, while comparisons with full-year data from 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2021 were used to identify market trends.

Supporting consumer research of 2,000 UK adults and 1,000 Scottish adults was carried out by Censuswide in July 2021.
